the subject of utility easements can be somewhat confusing, prompting a number of common questions: What is an easement? Why does it exist? Who owns the land? What can I do with it?

Utility easements are specified areas of a property that were defined for use by utility companies when the property was first platted, or mapped out. Easements can be designated for both overhead and underground utility lines, including electric, water, sewer, telephone and cable television.

When a community is being developed, it's much more cost-efficient to run utility lines straight across the entire area, rather than running them around each parcel of land. This helps utility companies reduce the cost of labor and materials needed to provide initial service to the neighborhood, as well as keeping maintenance costs lower. In this way, easements are beneficial for the entire community.

While utility easements can be located in the public right of way, such as along a road, they are frequently located on a homeowner's property. For example, a designated easement might lie along the edge of your property where your local water lines tie in to the main water supply line or public sewer.

In the case of a utility easement being situated on private property, the homeowner maintains ownership of their land. Some restrictions need to be placed on what the property owner can do within the easement, however, in order for the utility company to gain access to their lines for regular service or emergency repairs.


Non-structural improvements are generally allowable, such as walkways or fencing, but more permanent construction is restricted by necessity. These restrictions include: - Any permanent structure that would prevent access to utility lines in the event of an emergency, such as buildings, concrete driveways or retaining walls - Any object that could hinder long-term operation of utility lines, including lakes, detention ponds, swimming pools and large trees.
