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While summer holidays may be over now, we can expect hot and dry conditions to continue here in Texas for some time. And if you are trying to keep your grass green, it may seem like you spend all your time – and money – watering the yard.

With a little planning, you can create a healthy, low-maintenance yard that not only saves you time and money, but also conserves water resources. Here are a few tips to get you started.

A thoughtfully designed landscape allows you to take advantage of the natural topography of your property. Make note of slopes where water will run off, and plan groupings of plants with similar watering needs.

Consider the use of buffer zones made up of turf grass or other thick vegetation to absorb runoff, reducing wasted water pooling on driveways or sidewalks.

As you plan your landscape, don't overlook native plants that tend to be adapted to our local conditions. This is one of the easiest ways to design a low-maintenance, environmentally-friendly yard.

Plants that are native or well adapted to our area offer a number of benefits, including:

- Less need for water and fertilizer
- More tolerant of stressful conditions
- Less susceptible to pests.

A handy way to conserve water is to add mulch to reduce evaporation. Mulch also helps prevent erosion, suppress weeds and add nutrients. The best mulch comes from native sources such as straw, pine needles, leaves, grass clippings or compost.

An efficient irrigation plan helps maintain a land-

scape that is more resistant to pests and other problems. To create a deep, well-rooted lawn be sure to water thoroughly but not too frequently, wetting the soil to a depth of 4 –6 inches and allowing it to dry out between watering.

Water early in the morning, before 10 a.m. Between mid-morning and late afternoon you can lose as much as one-third of your water to evaporation.

With a little planning, you can create a beautiful landscape benefiting both you and the environment.


